




College Search Timeline

Junior Year

First Semester:

- Think broadly about colleges. Discuss your preliminary college choices with your HS counselor and your family.
- Attend any college planning and/or career programs and college day/night programs in your school or community.
- Begin gathering information about college costs and discuss family financial resources.
- Get information about scholarship and financial aid programs.

Second Semester:

- Plan to visit colleges during spring break or summer
- Look over colleges' websites



Senior Year

First Semester:

- Continue narrowing your list. Check application deadlines for your colleges of interest.
- Attend the college day/night program in your area and continue college visits. If you cannot visit a campus, connect with your admission counselor at that school.
- Complete your admissions applications and meet the deadlines.
- October: Colorado Free Application Days.
- Apply for financial aid.

Second Semester:

- Attend admitted student visits at colleges.
- Keep up the hard work you've done in high school!
- May 1: National Decision Day.



Three Step Process

- 1: Students decide where to apply
- 2: Colleges make admission decisions
- 3: Students choose where to enroll



O1. You decide where to apply

There are over 3,000 four-year schools and 1,500 two-year schools...

Take your time - enjoy the process

Use your imagination and consider a range of schools

Research based on best match – academics, financial, personal

Apply to enough schools to provide options and good comparisons

It's NOT a question of IF you'll be accepted, it's a question of WHEN and WHERE you'll be accepted.

(National Accept Rate= 70.1%)



What is important to you?

- Rural or city location?
- Small, medium or large enrollment?
- Diversity?
- Great weather?
- Modern facilities/amenities?
- Reputable academics/majors?
- Professors or Graduate Assistants?
- Internship and job opportunities?

Selective Admission

Only a small number typically admit fewer than 15% of applicants:

Air Force Academy, Brown, Cal Tech, Columbia, Harvard, MIT, Naval Academy, Princeton, Stanford, West Point, Yale...

Some of the schools that admit 15% to 30%:

Bates, Berkeley, Boston University, Carleton, Middlebury, Northeastern, UT Austin, Wesleyan, Williams...

MOST (90%) colleges and universities admit more than 50%:

CU Boulder, Colorado State University, Denver, Mines, MSU Denver, Puget Sound, San Diego, Santa Clara, Washington...

*Degree of selectivity can change from year-to-year




O2. Colleges Make Admission Decisions

Enrollment goals:

- Meet or exceed enrollment goal within budget!
- Academic profile: grades and test scores
- Diversity: geographic, race and ethnicity, economic, academic major, gender, etc.
- Motivated, honest and open to new ideas
- Talent music, art, theatre, athletics
- People who will contribute to campus and will become "part of the place"

How DU Makes Decisions

GPA

- Overall GPA (weighted when available)
- Academic courses
- Trends
- Close review of junior year
- # of As and Bs vs. Cs and Ds ("stub toe" vs. "offensive trend")

Test Scores OPTIONAL!

- ACT or SAT
- Super Score (mix/match)
- SAT- Critical Reading and Math (No writing)

Supporting Documents/Information

- Strength of Curriculum (CP, Honors, AP, IB; # per term and year)
- Strength of High School
- Essay
- Recommendations- Counselor and Teacher
- Activities
- Need-aware
- Demonstrated interest



Decision Types

Admit

- Admitted to the university
- Check your letter to confirm direct vs. pre-major status if applicable
- Merit scholarship should be included in letter

Rolled to Regular Decision OR Waitlisted

- The university needs a little bit more information from you
- Factors to consider: their middle 50% data and where you fit there, have you visited campus? Connected with a counselor?
- Tip: reach out to your counselor, carefully read letter, submit updated information: letter to express interest, 7th semester grades, additional recommendations

Deny

- Reach out to the school appeal options?
- Consider transferring in the future

Rolled to Regular Decision – "Demonstrated Interest"

High School: Public school in Colorado

Applied Early Action (EA) November 1 deadline

- Major: Psychology
- 4.2 weighted GPA, 1270 SAT, 3 "Demanding" curriculum
- 0 virtual visits, 0 campus visits, didn't attend a visit at her high school

December 13: notified to submit our Regular Decision Consideration form by January 15th

December 14: submitted that form – showed interest in DU

February 20: admitted to DU



Sample Decisions:

"Erica"

Deny

High School: Private boarding school in New England Applied Early Action (EA) November 1 deadline

- Major: Business Information & Analytics
- 2.82 weighted GPA, Test Optional, 3 "Demanding" curriculum
- Discipline sophomore year, violated school's policy on alcohol
 - Suspension

DU's Middle 50% weighted GPA: 3.72 - 4.0



Sample Decisions:

"Jeff"

Deny

High School: Private Catholic school in Dana Point, CA Applied Regular Decision (RD) January 15 Deadline

- Major: Undeclared Business
- 2.86 weighted GPA, 1220 SAT, 3 "Demanding" curriculum
- 16 semester Cs
 - 9 Cs were Junior Year
- 1 F Junior Year in Algebra 2/Trigonometry

DU's Middle 50% weighted GPA: 3.72 - 4.0



Who is the institution admitting?



Middle 50%	
SAT Composite	1250 – 1410*
SAT EBRW	630 – 710*
SAT Math	610 – 710*
ACT	28 - 33*
Weighted GPA	3.72 – 4.0

Transfer students: 3.30 cumulative GPA considered competitive for admission and merit consideration.




O3. You Choose Where to Enroll

- Process of "elimination" rather than a process of "selection"
- Identify your criteria and eliminate schools that don't meet your needs
- The perfect school does not exist!

Choose a place where you will grow academically and personally, and is affordable for your family.







Visiting Campus

When you are visiting a campus or researching it online, some things to consider:

- Size of the campus
- Variety of majors and programs offered
- Whether a campus offers your specific program of interest
- The diversity of the student body
- Class sizes and accessibility of professors
- The number and variety of student clubs, organizations, and sports opportunities
- Location and opportunities in the surrounding community
- Student support services
- Residence life
- Cost of attendance and financial aid opportunities
