I have designed this class to be personally relevant and thought provoking while at the same time, building your skills in note taking, writing, and critical thinking. The class moves at a quick, but not impossible, pace. There will be homework every night usually in the form of reading and note taking.

Summary of the work load-

Each day:

- reading/notes on a section(s) in the book.
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Every 2-4 weeks (approx):

- Notes for the chapter due
- Test on the chapter

Every Semester:

- 1 or 2 major projects that apply some major concepts.
- Misc. papers/assignments applicable to the material covered.

Note Taking Structure

In blue:

Write down the bold headings of the sections. Underline or box them so they standout. Make sure you cover all of the blue headings. just because there isn't a bold word doesn't mean there is not important information.

In green:

Put the major terms that answer the question you posed. Often they will be highlighted in bold print. Put the terms in your notebook at the far left. When you review, test your recall of the terms by covering the definitions.

In purple:

Next to the terms put their definitions, copy important diagrams that summarize concepts.

In Red:

Summarize the "Research in psychology" boxes. It is this empirical research that will have to learn and use for the support of your essay exams.

At the end of the chapter only: (learning outcomes)

in black

write down the learning outcomes at the beginning of the chapter. outline/bullet point answers to them

Rationale for the colors:

The brain likes contrast and novel stimuli. Color does that for the brain. If you find that having that many pens is s bother, then write your notes in the traditional black and blue, but use colored highlighters to get contrast.

Experiment with this system. Be creative! Make your notebook highly individual. Messy notebooks will returned and not graded.

Notes will be due the day of the exam on that particular chapter/section. Assume that you will have about 30 minutes of reading per homework session.

Films/Demonstrations-

The following films/activities will be shown this semester. If you or your student elect not to participate, an alternate assignment will be given. Please indicate only if you do NOT want your student to participate.

Lam Sam

Story about a special needs father and his daughter's need for nurturing

Small Town Ecstasy

(documentary of a man who is into the Ecstasy/Rave scene) From HBO and is a very good story on how drugs are ruining this man's life. Shows people on drugs.

Awakenings

True story of brain research on frozen patients.

A Beautiful Mind

True story of a man's struggle with schizophrenia.

One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest:

Story of a mental institution's residents and doctors. Questions diagnosis and contains many issues related to the treatment of mental health patients. Because this is rated R (one scene involving alcohol and prostitutes), it is not required viewing and an alternate assignment may be given.

Experimenter

Film about Stanley Milgram and the famous experiment about obedience to authority.

Stanford Prison Experiment

Film about Phil Zimbardo and the famous experiment carried out in the halls of Stanford University. (is rated R for intensity and brief nudity (just a person's bottom).

Hypnosis Demonstration

I may (as time allows) introduce the basics of hypnosis and will demonstrate progressive relaxation. There will be a hypnotist coming in to demonstrate in a fun stage show. Students are invited to watch and/or participate but not required.

Sensitive Topics-

The study of psychology may touch on sensitive subjects (abuse, sexual abuse, mental issues, etc.). If you or your students objects to this sort of material, another class may be more appropriate.

Testing and Grading:

In order to increase student understanding, objective tests *may* be graded in class by another student if the student is comfortable sharing their work.
